Type of Animals Accepted: Exotic birds, predominantly CITES I and II endangered birds.

Limit of Animal Number: The limit up animals is restricted by the space that is available at any given time.

Two to four may not be a problem. It becomes a problem when people have large numbers of birds.

Rates: Each bird must be tested to our specific standards before approval of taking the bird as this facility is very serious about insuring the continuing health of their existing flock. The tests (today) cost anywhere from \$250-400 per bird depending on the type of bird, tests needed and part of the country you live in (prices vary regionally we have discovered).

We *request* that the birds are sponsored annually. We do not accept birds because their caregivers have money. Nor do we turn away birds that should be here because their caregivers cannot afford to pay for their ongoing care. Sponsorship covers the annual base care of a bird and varies species by species. Example: a budgie costs about \$5 a month for us to care for while a large Macaw is about \$60 per month. We cannot look into someone's pocketbook or bank account. We only ask that people remain responsible and do the best they can...and if they can help birds who cannot be cared for by their former homes, that is most gratefully appreciated. We ask folks to keep in mind that those birds need care too. Our base monthly budget...not including growth projects (like our aviaries or new buildings) is about \$12,000.... Every penny we generate goes into bird care and projects which enhance the lives of these birds. The Oasis Sanctuary is a Rescue and Retirement facility for

exotic birds, predominantly CITES I and II endangered birds. We offer birds a stable and loving home for the duration of their natural lives. We do not sell or breed birds. Nor do we offer birds for adoption. The Oasis Sanctuary is proud to be the only exotic bird sanctuary to have dual accreditation from the American Sanctuary Association (ASA) and The Association of Sanctuaries (TAOS). Many of The Oasis birds come from other rehabilitation and/or adoption programs where qualified personnel have determined that it is not in the bird's best interests to be placed in private homes. Some of our birds have "special needs", are physically handicapped or challenged requiring unique living or feeding situations. Others have been bounced from home to home, often being physically and/or emotionally abused and have simply become too fearful of people to be companions to people any longer. A number of The Oasis birds are retired breeders, or other birds originally imported for production purposes, who, due to age, infirmity or temperament would often be facing euthanasia. Because many of our birds are not interested in or are incapable of human interaction, they are housed with the same or similar, compatible species in non-breeding pairs or small flocks in large flight cages. Of course, The Oasis Sanctuary also is home to a small number of perfectly "normal", healthy and contented birds, whose owners brought them here when life changes precluded them from continuing to care for their beloved companions. We accept birds whose owners have passed away or gone to nursing homes, when they are willed to The Oasis, or when the request is made by family members. These people recognize that the stability of perpetual care at our facility, with companionship of both people and other birds, is preferable to the possibility of being bounced from home to home over the long lifetime of the bird.

The Oasis Sanctuary realized a primary dream by acquiring and moving to a 71-acre parcel of land in the small community of Cascabel, located near the town of Benson in Southeastern Arizona. The temperate climate allows the healthy and able-bodied birds in our flock to be outdoors year round. The land contains a 21-acre non-productive pecan orchard. The deciduous trees provide a canopy of shade during the summer months and allow sunlight in winter. Birds with special needs and those who require more human interaction are kept indoors in our 1,300 square foot bird building. The Oasis Sanctuary was incorporated in the State of Arizona on May 22, 1997. We are a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. Our Federal EIN number is 86-0885646. We are also registered with the Secretary of State in Arizona as a recognized charity.

TARA (a 501 (c) 3 nonprofit corporation) provides public education on the care and behavior of exotic birds, and takes in abused, unwanted, handicapped, and elderly parrots from all parts of the Southwest. We place these birds in safe, loving environments with knowledgeable care givers.

Experienced bird lovers founded TARA in 1998 in response to the increasing number of unwanted birds and the needs of bird owners for good, up-to-date information on parrot care and behavior. One of TARA's main goals is to increase individuals' knowledge of what to expect from parrots and how to care for them properly. Parrots' high level of intelligence, their long lifespans, and their innate wild nature make their needs greater than most people can meet.

TARA does not "warehouse" rescued birds in a single facility. Instead, we provide them with more intimate surroundings and consistent care givers, with the care provided determined by the individual bird's needs. Some birds are fostered by volunteers in their homes, while others are housed in home aviaries with birds of their own species. TARA attempts to socialize rescued birds with other parrots as well as with humans, and we often pair up "bird buddies" of the same sex.

The Hermitage No-Kill Cat Shelter is a non-profit organization, supported entirely by private and corporate donations and exists solely for the shelter, protection and care of homeless cats. And it is Tucson's first no-kill, no-cage facility (except for quarantine). The Hermitage is a textbook example of how a fairly old private residence (built in 1948) can be converted to house over 300 cats and kittens in clean, yet homey conditions. Our facility comprises approximately 4,000 square feet under roof, with an additional 4,000 square feet of entirely fenced-in outdoor runs. Every one of our free-roaming felines has access to fresh air and sunlight without being in any danger from predators, vehicles, nasty people or other vagaries of civilization.

Specific rooms in the shelter are devoted to various categories of residents: eminently adoptable cats; shy cats; medically-challenged cats; "oldsters" (some well into their 20's); as well as cats who may be carriers of FeLV and FIV. Surviving Cat Program: Do you worry about what will happen to your beloved cat(s) upon your death? The Hermitage provides a Surviving Cat Program to cat owners who plan ahead regarding the welfare of their companion animals. There is a fee for this program, as it is very costly for the shelter to provide care for each cat. Based on an evaluation by the staff at The Hermitage and in the best interest of your cat's health and happiness, your cat will either be placed in a loving home, or will remain at the shelter. Rates: The donor is asked to give a donation of some kind to help off set the cost of accepting more animals. If a donation cannot be made, the animal will still be accepted... because most animals in that situation means the owner cannot afford to keep them any longer.

Hoofed Animal Humane Society of Arizona's shelter and sanctuary are located on 40 acres in Ashfork, AZ. They are considering a move to a different location if all the contracts can be worked out. They have a 10 stall 12x24 foot stalls with pens set up for groups of horses to be together. They turn separate groups out to roam the 40 acres at different times. This facility is supported solely by public donations and the adoption fees of the animals that are placed. They try to have at least 2 yard sales a year and attend some other animal fairs within the state to get more publicity and to help raise funding. Hoofed Animal Humane Society of Arizona will accept anything that can be used or resold (cars, boats, RV, tack, furniture, misc.) to help bring in money to help feed and care for the animals.

Animal Helpline is an incorporated non-profit organization run entirely on donations of people who love animals. Animal Helpline offers sanctuary to older or handicapped cats, as a no-kill shelter and retirement home. It is located on Morongo Valley, CA, and phone services are available free to the local area. This free service began in 1979 as easy phone-in help for people with pet problems. On the hotline, you will hear lists of the lost and found, offers minor first aid advice, pet placement, and help referrals to other organizations or veterinarians. In addition to these services, more than 1,500 cats have found shelter at Animal Helpline since 1979. Thirty dogs have also lived on location at

Animal Helpline over the years. A wide variety of farm animals have also lived on the premises. Any healthy animal that is transported to Animal Helpline will be warmly received, even from out of state. The grounds at the facility are open daily for visits, picnics and tours.

Expansion and completion of the shelter are ongoing, but are possible only through continuing tax-deductible donations by Helpline's friends. The shelter is run entirely by Judith Lindley and her family, keeping the operating costs at a minimum.

North County Humane Society (NCHS) has established Friend for Life, the first program in San Luis Obispo County designed to protect animal companions who survive their owners. The Friend for Life program is designed to find loving homes for all surviving animal companions enrolled in the program, including cats, dogs, other small mammals, birds, horses and reptiles. If a permanent adoptive home cannot be found, NCHS will itself become a loving home or will find a protective sanctuary for the surviving animal. "Friend for Life is meant to give pet owners peace of mind," according to NCHS Director of Development Alicia Morin. "This way you know that your cherished animal companions will be taken care of should you die or become incapacitated unexpectedly." To participate in the program a pet owner must be a member of the North County Humane Society. To enroll animal companions in the program, members make provisions through their will or other estate documents for NCHS to adopt surviving animals, and they are asked to make a planned gift, such as a bequest, to NCHS.

To enroll your animal companion in this life assurance program simply place in your last will and testament language similar to the following:

"At the time of my death I give (my dog, my two cats) owned by me to The Marin Humane Society to be placed in a loving home consistent with the individual pet resumes that I have sent to the Society."

Then, send a copy of the Guardian Notification form to the Society along with completed Pet Owner Questionnaire and Medical History. Please keep these profiles current with the Society, the executor of your estate and with your important papers. They will, in turn, send you an Emergency Notification Card to carry with you at all times. It is a gift of love to do such a simple thing for the animals who give you so much in return.

Rates: This is a FREE service for Pets In Need adopters and members who specify in their Wills or Trust Documents that their pet companions are to be entrusted to Pets In Need at the time of their death. The person must have been a member for at least one year.

Pets In Need (PIN) was founded in 1965 by Jean Mahoney and Alice Hodges to help lost pets get home and to provide information about pet care to people. Most of all they wanted all dogs and cats to have loving homes. After years of operating out of private garages and offices or a tiny rented kennel, in 1993 Pets In Need entered a new era of service to our community's animals. PIN purchased a warehouse and built a professional kennel to house eighteen dogs and thirty-five cats. Pets In Need's mission is to bring a loving, healthy home within paw's reach of every adoptable dog and cat in our community. No animal suitable for re-homing is ever put to death... no matter how long it takes. PIN is committed to finding homes for each animal in the shelter. Every dog or cat is spayed or neutered prior to adoption. Pets In Need (PIN) is a private no-kill adoption shelter. This means that Pets In Need's humane work is made possible by donations. PIN has no city or county contracts and receives no local, state or federal tax money. Last year, 89% of PIN funding was donations from individuals and organizations who care. One percent was from charitable foundations. Ten percent was from fees for service such as Adoptions and Canine College. Pets In Need is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization and is not funded by a city or county animal control contract.

Limit of Animal Number: Each individual may place up to 2 pets in the program. But grant exceptions may be granted for certain situations.

Rates: FREE for adopters, volunteers or anyone who makes an annual donation of any amount. Of course we always invite people to make a lasting gift through a bequest or trust, but we want to be there for the animals who were companions to the people who were there to help ARF during their life-time.

The ARF Guardian Program is a free service for ARF's adopters and supporters who specify in their Will or Trust Document that their companion animals are to be entrusted to ARF at the time of their death. We are not a membership organization. We define membership as anyone who makes an annual contribution.

This program is our way of being there for our donors' furry friend when the donor is no longer able to be there. This service is for dogs and cats. There is a limit of two (2) pets per person, the animals must meet ARF's Health and Adoption standards, and the person must have been an annual donor. To ensure that your furry friend will be well cared for and safe if you should predecease your beloved friend, we recommend that the guardian prepare written instructions including their pet's likes and dislikes and the name of their furry friend's regular veterinarian. For your convenience, please see enclosed supply of pet information forms. The information should be updated every six months and kept at home in a safe place.

The caregiver should also make arrangements with a trusted friend or relative to transport the companion animal to ARF when the time comes. The pet will be evaluated by our veterinarian and will be given any special care needed. Then we will begin looking for another loving home for the beloved pet. At ARF, no animal suitable for re-homing is ever put to death...no matter how long it takes. We are a completely privately funded no-kill animal shelter. While our Guardian Program is free for donors we find that very often our supporters want to make a lasting legacy to help their pet or to help other pets. We are always grateful when one of our contributors wants to make a lasting gift for the animals.

Limit of Animal Number: No limit. The only limiting factor is that adequate financial provisions have to be made for the care of each cat.

Rates: The financial provision can vary depending on several factors (age, health condition, special medical needs of the cat). However, a good general guideline is a \$5,000 lifetime fee for the care of each cat.

Our mission is to assist with and provide for the health and welfare of the animals that have been abused, mistreated, abandoned and injured; to promote the bond between animals and people; and to instill an appreciation and respect for all living creatures with who we share this earth.

The California Feline Foundation was established in 1992 to improve the welfare of companion animals. The Foundation's mission is to alleviate pet overpopulation through spaying and neutering programs rather than the traditional method of euthanasia, and to provide care and shelter for homeless cats and kittens until they are adopted into good homes. Our primary goal is to impact the pet overpopulation problem in a long-term, lasting manner rather than seeking a temporary solution. The Foundation's Shelter and Adoption Center houses as many as 300 cats and kittens at any one time until they are placed in good homes. Upon entering the shelter, each cat or kitten is tested for feline leukemia and FIV, and given rabies, leukemia, and 4-1 vaccinations. Any additional medical treatment is administered as needed. All are spayed or

neutered and implanted with microchip identification before they leave the shelter. The California Feline Foundation's low-cost spay/neuter clinic has performed over 12,000 surgeries since opening its doors. The clinic spays or neuters cats and kittens 8 weeks of age and older for only \$20. This service is available to low-income families, AFDC & SSI recipients, seniors, feral colony caregivers and animal rescue groups.

These fees reflect the minimum amount required for the care of your cat(s). Cats live out their normal lives in comfort, care and lots of love. No cats are euthanized except for those suffering or diagnosed as "terminally ill" and then only when euthanasia has been recommended by the shelter veterinarian. Any funds over and above this amount enable us to provide a home and care for less fortunate cats. Friends of Cats is a private non-profit organization located in El Cajon, California. We are dedicated to providing shelter and medical care to abandoned cats and those whose owners are unable to care for them. Once their health is assured, we try to find good homes for them. WE DO NOT PUT CATS TO SLEEP, except as a matter of compassion if they are fatally ill. Although the number of residents fluctuates, we usually have around 350 cats at the Shelter. We have recently expanded our facility for FELV/FIV cats, added a porch to our Shy Cat Trailer and updated our Cozy Cottage and our Kitten Cottage. We have made much progress, but we are still in great need of help in updating the Shelter and providing the best care for our feline friends. Friends of Cats began in 1927 when several San Diego men and women pooled their resources to form the Animal Rescue League and purchased all of the animals from the pound in order to place them in good homes. In 1929, a remarkable woman named Maude Erwin took over the care of 20 cats living at the League shelter. Many more cats soon came, and concerned friends raised funds to help maintain Mrs. Erwin's shelter in Pacific Beach. In 1954, a Board of Directors was organized and the Maude Erwin Foundation of Cats received its charter. The ensuing years brought more cats to the Foundation until, in 1957, Mrs. Erwin was caring for over 300 cats. In 1966, the Shelter moved to its present location at Flinn Springs (east El Cajon) and in 1968 the name of the organization was officially changed to Friends of Cats, Inc. Cozy Cottage/Lifetime Care: Lifetime care in a homelike atmosphere is available in Caper's Cozy Cottage. This care is specifically designed to serve the needs of cats whose owners can no longer care for them and do not desire an adoptive home but prefer to have the cats become permanent residents at the shelter.

It is quite different from any other shelters existing for two very important reasons. Our resident cats live uncaged except for new admittees awaiting neutering or cats receiving medical treatment. We do NOT euthanize any of our cats for any reason except terminal, suffering illness. Our shelter consists of two regular houses, which are joined together by a large glassed patio. Other separate buildings include our admissions/office area, our clinic and our kitten "condo" that are to the rear. Each of our houses has large metal mesh doors, which separate the rooms and each room is designed to project a living room type surrounding. Each house also contains a large fully screened and "escape proof" patio with many wooden shelves for climbing, sunning and playing. The access to both houses is from the rear, which itself is fully fenced to prevent escape. We house and care for about 300 cats at any one time. We screen adopting parents to be certain they will provide devoted, indoor homes. We are limited in our number due to space requirements and, of course, funding. Cats who are new admittees are checked for FeLV and receive a medical examination. They receive their 4 in 1 shot and Leukemia shots and are weighed and their teeth checked. In the following days they are neutered or spayed if unaltered. They are then placed in our kitty house where they can become accustomed to living with other cats and where we closely monitor their eating and behavior patterns. The "cat" house is cageless, fully furnished for the cats' comforts and kept spotlessly clean. Food, fresh water and clean litter are always available. Low ash dry food is plentiful in supply and the cats are fed their "wet" meals twice daily that consist of nutritionally balanced beef by-products, specifically formulated for cats. There are toys to play with, sofas, chairs, cat climbing trees, pillows and beds to lay on, patios to visit and much human companionship, petting and loving. They are quite at home and ready and willing to greet our many shelter visitors. They are constantly watched for any signs of medical problems and any ill cat is immediately taken to our clinic. Routine problems are handled in house and supervised by our overseeing vet; complex cases are treated at our veterinarian's hospital. We provide all of our "residents" with regularly scheduled booster vaccines and even regular dental care! Our cats are flea free, ear mite free and very healthy indeed. You won't see any sniffles or runny eyes in our midst and all of our cats receive devoted care from all of our staff and many volunteers.

It is understandable, everyone reaches a point where they just wouldn't be doing the right thing for the new bird and the birds they already have. When the adoption program was phased out of the club they still received occasional telephone calls from people looking to place parrots that they could no longer care for and they were happy to continue helping in whatever way they could. Over the years the amount of calls they received continued to grow until they found themselves in a position in which they no longer had the resources to care for all of the birds that came into their care. This is why Rose & Frank decided to form a volunteer based group dedicated to helping secondhand parrots.

A bequest to the Humane Society can be a part of your estate plan, providing tax benefits and providing for your long-term financial needs while supporting the homeless animals.

We will be pleased to discuss your individual bird's needs with you concerning your wishes for its long-term care, whether in sanctuary, foster care or adoption placement. The Gabriel Foundation has been in operation since 1996 and is a 501(c)(3) avicultural and veterinary affiliated parrot welfare organization licensed by the state of Colorado, promoting educational outreach, conservation, rescue, rehabilitation, adoption, and sanctuary pertaining to the needs of parrots everywhere. The Gabriel Foundation maintains a sanctuary for parrots until they can be adopted, or in the event they are unable to be adopted. The number of residents at The Gabriel Foundation aviaries fluctuates between 150 to 200 birds. The purpose of Colorado Horse Rescue is to promote the prevention of equine abuse because we believe in humane treatment and survival as an alternative to slaughter or public auction for abandoned, neglected and unwanted horses. We shall provide shelter, food, daily care, medical treatment, and rehabilitation and adoption services for horses in need of such refuge. We shall obtain legal ownership of donated horses accepted into our guardianship, with the goal to place these horses into caring and suitable adoptive homes. We shall search for and examine potential adoptive owners for horses in our custody. We shall serve as a shelter and provide care for legally impounded horses. We shall report and assist legal authorities in resolving equine abuse cases. We shall participate in the rescue and urgent care for horses involved in natural disasters or emergencies. We shall develop and initiate education classes on equine care and handling with the hopes to cultivate prevention of equine abuse due to negligence and ignorance within the community. CHR is dedicated to providing urgent care for horses in peril and medical treatment for emaciated horses suffering from starvation. As rescue and rehabilitation are part of the mission, CHR's efforts are also directed to the pursuance of successful adoptions - placing horses in new and caring homes. Additionally, CHR is a shelter for impounded horses - as legal action taken by the State Veterinarian, local and other authorities because of maltreatment by the horse's owner. CHR accepts donated horses from owners who wish to relinquish ownership for various reasons, such as the owner can no longer provide adequate care or the owner is moving and can not relocate the horse. Many of these donated horses are healthy and are merely in need of a new adoptive family. Colorado Horse Rescue (CHR) enlists the skills, efforts and expertise from a team of 400 volunteers. Volunteers actively involved with the regular care of the horses devote their time to feeding, exercising, medical treatment, grooming, and cleaning stalls. As some volunteers are responsible for the daily tasks of caring for the horses, other volunteers work in various departments within the organization - such as fundraising, special programs, education services, adoption placement, follow-ups, business operations, computer services and facility maintenance. CHR is responsible for providing quality care and handling an average of 45 horses a month, sometimes as many as 60 horses, that are in its guardianship. Veterinarian and farrier services are performed on a weekly basis as per an individual horse's needs. Upon a healthy prognosis and/or recovery, a horse is then evaluated in order to examine its training and experience. Riding evaluations, performed only by a select few of expert volunteer equestrians, are conducted to determine the most suitable environment and conditions of the adoptive home for the horse to be placed.

The Horse Shelter's mission is to see that New Mexico's horses are as safe and well cared for as possible. Their approach is a multi-faceted one: while their main mission is to help owners care for their own horses, some horses live at the Shelter itself, where they have run-in stalls and large paddocks and turn-outs, clean, healthy surroundings, appropriate food, good water at all times, veterinary care, farrier care, exercise when appropriate, and the attention of a live-in caretaker (and many volunteers).

The Horse Shelter also conducts a humane education program, reaching out to schools, clubs, and groups of all kinds. The presenters are trained, and convey the message that kind and responsible treatment of others - horses and all two and four legged creatures - is rewarding in many ways.

For some horses the Shelter will be a life-long sanctuary; others will be adopted out to carefully screened new homes, after rehabilitation as needed. The staff of The Horse Shelter investigates all reports of abuse and neglect, and makes every effort to improve a situation instead of removing a horse from his guardian, only taking a horse into the Shelter if such efforts fail.

Wild Cat Ranch Pet Retirement Center was established 11 years ago. NORMAL care costs \$170 per month or \$1500 annual fee if paid in advance if we support the animal in the event you may be expected to get well and return home, whereupon we can return the animal to you. Most owners can determine the cost of this type of care and make a bequest of the animal and the funds in a will and/or trust by multiplying the annual amount times the remaining lifespan of their pet (which is 16 years for a cat and a dog). EXTRA care, which involves giving medicine or some type of treatment once or more a day to treat a particular condition or dysfunction is \$195 per month or \$1750 annual fee if paid in advance, if we support the animal in the event you may be expected to get well and return home, etc. Most owners can determine the cost of this type of care and make a bequest of the animal and the funds in a will and/or trust by multiplying the annual amount times the remaining lifespan of their pet (which is 16 years for a cat and a dog). EXTRA SPECIAL CARE, which involves all of the above, plus more attentiveness and loving because of a disability of the animal, such as blindness, deafness, paralysis, or missing limbs or an eye or just because you, as the owner, wish to have extra brushing and grooming and attention given to that animal regardless of its health is \$250 per month or \$2500 annual fee if paid in advance, if we support the animal in the event you may be expected to get well and return home, etc. Most owners can determine the cost of this type of care and make a bequest of the animal and the funds in a will and/or trust by multiplying the annual amount times the remaining lifespan of their pet (which is 16 years for a cat and a dog). Owners with additional pets to retire need only pay a portion of the board for the first pet for the remaining pets, which is negotiated with us. For bequest planning, it would be approximately 1/2 of the cost for the second pet, 1/3rd of the cost for the third pet, and 1/4th of the cost for each pet thereafter in the same bequest. Located in the Beautiful Hill Country of Texas, 56 miles northwest of San Antonio and 65 miles southwest of Austin, we have set up our 53-acre working dairy goat ranch as a retirement home for cats (although upon occasion we have made arrangements for other types of pets). We presently care for 302 cats (166 permanent care and 136 long-term boarding), 14 dogs (8 permanent care and 6 long-term boarding), 4 potbelly pigs (permanent care), and 2 rabbits (permanent care). We are a not-for-profit cattery/kennel designed to provide a permanent home for the beloved pets of the dying and/or deceased. We are not licensed to be a charitable animal sanctuary finding homes for stray or unwanted animals. We are not licensed for exotics (lions, tigers). The cost of this covers food, litter, cleaning and grooming help, medical insurance, annual shots, dental cleaning every two years, and pest control. Nevertheless, we are willing to negotiate with you on monthly billing for those on limited incomes, especially when you have elderly that require home nursing and other care. Our charter, however, is to take permanent care of the pets of the deceased who has willed them to us and covered costs through a bequest or who has set up a trust for their care, as covered in Section 5. We have converted a large outbuilding into a cattery (more descriptions). Although once a horse barn, it has been converted into fine living quarters for cats that are easy to keep clean, are climate controlled, and have plenty of sunshine (picture windows), cat trees for climbing and scratching, pictures on the wall, and so on. The cats are allowed outside in a screened-in play area. We have a professional pest controller spray around the area every two or three months for fleas, scorpions, ants, etc. The cattery is on a separate power box and it's own pump that pumps un-chlorinated water, sediment filter only (which is healthier for your pets than chlorinated water that kills beneficial bacteria in their intestines). Your bequests cover the all of the above costs and we maintain reserves to handle any medical emergencies. We have separate areas to take care of cats with AIDS, cats with feline leukemia, and those with other handicaps. All the animals have easy access to self-feeders for dry food and water, and canned food is given once a day at dinner time. The cats are combed once a week. They all get a yearly checkup along with their annual required vaccinations, and dental cleaning every two years. They are all played with and petted every day. The cattery is vacuumed and spills and messes cleaned and disinfected every day. This is NORMAL care. To protect the animals that we already have in our cattery and the new arrivals, we require veterinary records to show that all of the animals have received the following vaccinations: Rabies, Distemper, and Feline Leukemia. We also require that they be tested for Feline AIDS and Feline Leukemia and the results indicated in the veterinary records.

Animals can be shipped to us with Feline Leukemia, AIDS, or any other problem, it just must be noted on the Health Certificates along with the dates of immunizations. If an animal is sickly, it may not survive any method of transportation to Texas and may not be shipped until it has recovered or in better health for a rigorous trip. A rabid animal, of course, can never be shipped by any means across state lines. The site also lists shipping/transport companies and regulations for transporting your animal to the Wildcat Ranch.

At Habitat for Horses, our mission comes first: To rescue abused horses and to provide sanctuary for the healing and growth of both horses and young people through equine-assisted activities. Habitat for Horses is located on a 27 acre ranch in Galveston County, Texas. Midway between the booming economy of NASA at Clear Lake and the tourist town of Galveston, the local area is predominately rural, with a large population of horses. Our ranch facility was donated to us by a former Galveston police officer. In addition to the ranch, we have a 3-stall ICU barn at a separate location, currently housing those horses unable to exist within the ranch herd. Everything on the ranch - paddocks, shelters, fencing and water lines - were all built by volunteers. The materials were paid for by donations from our members. The exact location of the ranch is not publicized because of threats made against the horses and the staff by abusive owners who have had their horses removed from them. Visitors and volunteers must be cleared by the staff prior to visiting and are allowed on the ranch only by appointment. Security is maintained by the watchful eyes of the Hitchcock Police Department. We are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization registered with the IRS and incorporated in the State of Texas.

The Stevenson Companion Animal Life-Care Center provides the physical, emotional, and medical needs of companion animals whose owners are no longer able to provide that care. Clients of the center include pet owners who want to assure their pet's future prior to entering a retirement home, being hospitalized for an extended period, or predeceasing a pet. The center was established by the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine in 1993 at the suggestion of Dr. E. W. "Ned" Ellett, former head of the Small Animal Clinic at Texas A&M University. Dr. Ellett's dream became a reality with generous donations from the Luse Foundation and Mrs. Madlin Stevenson. Mrs. Stevenson said she chose to support the center because, "Animals are especially important to the elderly; this center is dedicated to them and their pets." Mrs. Stevenson, a life-long animal lover, passed away in September of 2000. Her 4 cats, 7 dogs, pony, and llama came to reside at the center at that time. Another one of her cats is enrolled in our Extended Home Care Program. Our residents feel at home in the Center. It is designed in a relaxed fashion. The animals have freedom to roam and explore at will, while also having space for themselves during quiet times. Medical care includes regular physical examinations and laboratory tests as needed. Each pet is observed in order to develop a personal "wellness" program. When our pets need medical attention, their care is provided by the Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital. Their knowledge of the latest advances in veterinary medicine, combined with the use of our specialized facilities, ensures the best possible care for our residents. Residents receive daily exercise with scheduled walks and activities conducted by student residents as well as regular bathing and grooming. Nutritional concerns are also monitored and special diets are developed for residents with special needs.
