The Last Post is a home for animals established by radio personality Pegeen Fitzgerald in 1982. It is owned and operated by the Vivisection Investigation League, Anti-Vivisection Society of New York, Inc., a charitable tax-exempt corporation. Created with cats in mind, the Last Post takes in strays and rescues felines from euthanasia; in addition, pet owners can will their feline companions to the shelter. But no matter how the cats get to the Last Post, they live their lives in style. The establishment sits on 37 acres of land designated a wildlife sanctuary. There are several buildings on the grounds, all homes for cats. Each building has been designed with cats in mind. Posts and beams do more than hold up the structure -- cats climb the posts and perch on the beams for a good view of their surroundings. Many large windows and skylights line the buildings so the cats can get their fill of sunshine from inside while decks surround each building allowing cats to venture outside without straying too far from home. When you enter a building that is home to a group of cats, don't be surprised if two dozen felines make a run for you and entwine themselves betwixt your legs. If you happen to sit on one of the numerous couches, it's likely you'll have two cats sitting on your shoulders and three more on your lap -- all purring. Most cats are available for adoption, and those that are not adopted live out their lives happily at the Last Post. And, fret not, all cats are spayed or neutered by the staff vet upon arrival at the Post. Currently, the Last Post is home to over 370 cats, four dogs (two of which are Dalmatian puppies up for adoption), two goats and a pig who goes by the name of Miss Piggy.

Unwanted, abandoned and surrendered birds are accepted into LBH&R and in return, may be adopted to qualified applicants. Our policy and services are as follows:

1. We will accept birds surrendered to LBH&R.
2. People wanting to surrender birds maybe placed on a waiting list pending space availability or, foster care availability.

3. LBH&R does not breed birds placed with us and we do NOT place birds into breeding situations.
4. We do not adopt to children.
5. We do not adopt birds as companions to other birds.
6. As a general rule, we will not place a Cockatoo, Macaw or other noisy bird in an apartment or condo.
7. Birds must remain in 100% smoke free quarters.
8. Birds are to remain in the home and be treated as a family member.
9. Adopted birds may NOT be sold, given away, bred or used for any type of monetary purpose.
10. All potential adopters will receive a home visit from a LBH&R representative prior to being approved for any adoption.
11. APPROVED applications will be placed on a waiting list if a bird is not currently in our system that would be a good match for the approved adopter.
12. Adopters are required to pay an adoption fee and may need to reimburse LBH&R for vet fees for their bird.
13. LBH&R will make every attempt to see that a bird can remain in it's current home with counseling and behavior modification IF this is in best interest of the bird.

We do not designate one particular, breed, we try to help them all. HorseNet accepts animals from any state in any condition from private owners to state animal control facilities. To date, we have never turned away an animal in need. We feel that every animal deserves a second chance and that is HorseNet's mission. HorseNet Horse Rescue (HorseNet Inc.) falls under Internal Revenue Service code IRC 513. Rev. Rul. 73-587, 1973-2 C.B. 192, which states. "The income derived by an exempt organization, organized and operated for the prevention of cruelty to animals..." HorseNet will perform similar activities for care, protection, and placement of abused horses and therefore qualified for exemption from federal income taxation under [§ 501\(c\)\(3\)](#) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization formed and operated exclusively for the prevention of cruelty to animals.

Foster Parrots was established in 1990 when we became aware of the large number of parrots that were living lives of neglect and abuse and was incorporated as a non-profit rescue and adoption service, specifically for parrots, in February of 1999. We received our 501(C)-3 classification from the I.R.S. on May 19, 1999 and are now tax-exempt. All donations are now tax deductible to the fullest extent allowable by law. Birds are now the second most popular pets in the United States. Along with that popularity has come the many problems that are normally encountered with more traditional domesticated species such as dogs and cats. The major difference, we believe, is that most of the parrots now kept as pets are not domesticated through years of selective breeding but instead, are only one or two generations removed from their wild ancestors. In fact many were caught in the wild and imported to the U.S. during the 1960's up until the early 1990's when it became illegal to do so. Many of these "wild caughts" retain their wild traits and have been sold and resold to a number of guardians. Herein lie the problems, which make our organization, and others like it, needed. These parrots, which are many times bought on impulse and without knowledge of their emotional needs will, in many cases, react to the lack of attention by their guardians in an unfavorable manner. As many are semi-tame and have not known a stable and consistent home, these birds can have behavioral problems and can be dangerous as pets. These birds are doomed to being passed from one guardian to another or back to the pet shop as each new guardian realizes that their new pet will never be the "Busch Gardens" bird they had hoped for. Many will bite, scream or even resort to self-mutilation in an effort to get attention from an uncaring guardian. Thus starts a cycle, which can be repeated many times during the bird's long life. Unlike a dog or cat, whose life is relatively short in comparison, a parrot should live from 20 to 100 years depending on the species. This of course assumes that the bird has survived the nutritional neglect offered by many casual bird guardians. In the effort to stop this endless cycle we formed Foster Parrots Ltd. to offer an alternative to people who needed to find a caring "home for life" for their bird and to offer a retirement home for the birds deemed unsuitable for placement. We are currently receiving or placing ten to thirty birds, on average, per month. Our goals include offering these unadoptable birds a permanent "retirement" home and finding good, caring homes for the adoptable birds that have been given up by their guardians due to unforeseen difficulties. We have encountered many cases where birds have been given up for adoption when their guardians have become ill or divorced. These people needed to place their birds quickly and felt uncomfortable with the options of reselling their bird back to a pet shop, in the want ads or giving the bird to friends or family where questionable care might be offered. We have also received birds that have been given up because of unacceptable vocalization or dangerous behavior. We hope to offer people the security of knowing that their bird will be cared for and that time will be taken when finding a new home with a sincere, dedicated and appropriate person. We do not purchase birds. We also offer a help line for new caretakers with questions. Please limit your calls to between 6 and 8 pm eastern time. Since 1990, we have taken in hundreds of birds, from parakeets to macaws. Many of these birds will probably be permanent residents due to medical or behavioral problems. Many others (about 20-25%) have been placed in homes that we continue to monitor. The remaining birds are awaiting placement, a process that involves an application and the signing of a contract of care by the adopting party. Until now, we have relied on word of mouth to receive birds and to find adoptive homes. We anticipate the effect of internet exposure will be more adoptions as well as more desperate people wanting to give up their birds to our care. As many of these birds will need care for up to 100 years, our task is formidable. Space is running out for the care of large birds like macaws and cockatoos. We will need to expand the available space soon. Our short-term hopes are to renovate the ground floor of our barn, the upper two floors of which now serve as an aviary. Our long-term goals are to purchase land on which three large aviaries can be built, one housing birds of Africa, another housing South American birds, and a third where the birds of Austral-Asia can be kept, all without cages in a natural setting that will also serve as an educational center for local schools. In our current location this is only possible on a limited basis. We do invite people to visit and we are very happy to share whatever knowledge we have gained with any prospective or current parrot guardians. Foster Parrots is a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the lives of parrots, as pets and in their natural habitats. We are located just south of Boston Massachusetts. ReRun Inc. is a 501(c)(3) non-profit Thoroughbred adoption program founded in 1996 whose mission is to provide a safe haven for Thoroughbred racehorses at the end of their career. They are given time for rehabilitation and retraining before being placed into adoptive homes and helped to find a second career. The organization tries to be a "pass-through" organization, not a permanent care facility; adoption is pushed. Horses accepted into the program are evaluated, rested and rehabilitated as needed. The Thoroughbreds are then placed with qualified adopters to begin their chance at a second career.

The organization, which is in its 13th year, works collaboratively with farms in New Jersey, New York, Illinois and Kentucky to nurse horses back to competitive shape or at least so that they are healthy enough to make good pets. In New Jersey, LumberJack Farm, in Cookstown, and Perfenick Farm, in Jobstown, board 18 former racehorses for ReRun.

Felice Busto, vice president of the New Jersey chapter of ReRun, said horses are sent to Canada and Mexico to be killed and have their meat exported to Europe and Japan, where it is a delicacy. ReRun has worked to save more than 500 horses, according to Ms. Busto, and continues work to raise funds to achieve that goal.

Horses that are rehabilitated are available for adoption to "qualified" homes.
